







What is the trend in your lake association membership, over the previous year?





What % of local property owners are paid members of your association?







VOLUNTEERING



When people feel a strong sense of belonging to a group, they are more willing to contribute and they take ownership of the group's struggles. They show concern for other members of the group and will try to help them overcome their problems.

ON THE RISE: PARTICIPATION IN COMMUNITY GROUPS

Involvement in the community does not have to be formal or even highly organized for it to count. Meaningful participation can simply look like groups of people who get together on a regular basis to do an activity together or discuss things that are important to them.²⁷ % Canadians participating in a group, association or organization:

The increase in the rate of participation over that time was twice as high for women as for men.

Volunteers today are different: Today's Canadians tend to be more goaloriented and have greater structure in their school, work, family, and social lives. They are mobile, technologically savvy, value autonomy, and have multiple interests and roles within the community.







INHERITANCE BY ASSET







Trends in Ownership

- User-driven vacation rental websites make it easier for owners to finance and sell recreational properties.
- Baby boomers spark demand: 53 per cent of regions surveyed report an increase in retiree or near-retirement buyers compared to last year.
- Low dollar prompting Canadians to sell their U.S. property and reinvest in Canadian recreational regions.
- Cottages that are quiet (94%) and private (91%) are most important; sandy beach (75%), access to water (75%)



Lake Partner Program (LPP) is Ontario's volunteer inland lakes monitoring program. Each year, approximately 600 volunteers (i.e., lake stewards or citizen scientists) monitor nearly 550 inland lakes at over 800 sampling locations.

About 85% of the volunteers sample lakes on the Canadian Shield.

Most of the lakes in Ontario's LPP are oligotrophic (62%), and tend to be located on the Canadian Shield. 31% are mesotrophic, and the remaining 7% are eutrophic, and tend to be located off the Canadian Shield.



What Type of Lake Do You Live By?

There are three basic types of lakes found in Ontario. You can learn more about your lake's unique characteristics by contacting your local Conservation Authority, Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) or cottage

Oligotrophic Lakes

- Generally deep
- Minimal aquatic plant growth
- Low nutrient levels
- Support cold-water fish such as trout and whitefish
- Low levels of phosphorus and chlorophyll
- Most lakes on the Canadian shield are oligotrophic with some exceptions

Mesotrophic Lakes

- Medium depth

- Usually good for fishing; support a wide variety of fish such as walleye and bass More nutrients than oligotrophic lakes, but not nearly as much as eutrophic lakes

Eutrophic Lakes

- Generally shallow with abundant vegetation
- Support warm-water fish such as perch, bass and pan fish Frequent algae blooms
- Susceptible to oxygen depletion
- High phosphorus or chlorophyll readings

Eutrophication is a lake's aging process. Sediments, erosion and the decomposition of aquatic plants eventually fill up the the lake is converted to a wetland (e.g.

Be Smart About Septic Systems With septic systems what goes in, must come out! Most of Ontario's waterfront property owners rely on on-site wastewater treatment systems to manage household water. Maintaining your septic system is critical to ensuring that your Wastewater does not add excess nutrients to your lake or contaminate

groundwater. Some tips:

- Have your septic tank inspected and pumped out on a regular basis. The frequency of your pump-outs will vary based on the size of your tank, your family size, and the number of appliances you use. As a general rule, pump

- Avoid constructing patios, decks or parking areas over your septic tile bed.

- Avoid planting certain species of trees around the leaching bed area. Willow roots can clog pipes and shade the septic area, slowing evaporation. Do not water your lawn around leaching bed area; extra water can reduce the bed's ability to absorb and treat waste water from the house. Direct rainwater from roofs, patios and driveways away from the leaching bed
