- Few birds, other than Canada Geese, no other land-based animals seen.








TWO KEY EVENTS

- 2) Plant native trees and shrubs to create a buffer at the waterfront




- Our daughter was a triple major at a US University in Government Studies, Environmental Science and Economics.
