Let's face it – aquatic plants get a bad rap. We refer to them as "weeds" or, even less accurately, "seaweed". Within our lakes – mostly below the surface – exists a diverse and beautiful underwater forest. Native aquatic plants benefit our lakes by taking up nutrients, and stabilizing shorelines and bottom sediments. They provide habitat for fish, frogs, turtles, and insects, and feeding areas for many waterfowl.
