


This zine was developed as a product of Youth Climate Lab's RAD Cohort, and includes insights directly from RAD participants. The zine was developed on stolen land across Turtle Island. As settlers, it is important to recognize that we operate on stolen land that was taken through violent acts. As we organize around anti-racism and decolonization, we recognize the ways in which our presence on this land upholds colonialism and reproduces dispossession and violence against Indigenous people. We commit to working and learning more about how we can prioritize upholding the conditions of the treaties that govern this land. Through our actions, we hope to honour all Indigenous communities and peoples across Turtle Island, who are the traditional guardians of this land, past, present, and future.





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
partnerships for the goals

From Summer 2021 to January 2022, 10 Canadian youth, of different identities, ethnicities, and walks of life, all motivated by climate justice, came together with open minds to experiment in the RAD Cohort, a program aimed to foster and highlight the importance of youth-led radical collaboration to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), while integrating a justice-oriented approach to the 2030 Agenda.

**RAD Cohort** was a space for radical collaboration in practice, that took its shape and was molded by the participant's own curiosity to deepen their climate knowledge and develop collaboration skills. Participants engaged in the experience through a variety of facilitated spaces, including

- guest learning sessions on climate justice, SDGs & other topics
- leadership development workshops
- arts-based activities and unconventional knowledge-sharing sessions
- team building exercises





# CENTERING AROUND ENVIRONMENTAL & CLIMATE JUSTICE




We all depend on the physical environment and plentiful bounty.

Working together to advocate for changes in policies to rectify these impacts and advance a society that fosters sustainable, cooperative regenerative communities. We recognize how climate change is a symptom of historical and intersecting systemic forces at play, such as colonialism, racial capitalism, and patriarchy—the same issues that cause and perpetuate violence towards BIPOC communities.

# WHAT IS RADICAL COLLABORTATION?

Radical collaboration is based on a key principle from design thinking. It speaks to co-creation and is inspired by the desire to learn from others and embrace diverse perspectives within the processes of problem-scoping, idea generation, solutions finding, and innovation. It allows us to work with others in ways that are openended, non-conventional and non-traditional, to spark transformative action and solutions through unusual and unexpected connections for current environmental problems within our communities.

#### **Reflection Questions**

What makes collaboration "radical"? How do we do justice to the depth and historical context of radical action? Where does activism fit?



"The root of the word "radical" is root.

What if rather than treating "radical" as some form of outlier or extreme, it is a reminder of how we root ourselves, reconnecting to the root of what is core, nourishing and foundational in our work.




## CREATIVE






### INCLUSIVE

#### **Reflection Question**

Does radical collaboration, by definition, mean collaborating with the powers that be?

### CATALYTIC

Our partnerships amplify strong, existing initiatives and spark new and unique programs – ensuring that we use our resources as effectively as possible without doubling efforts in the climate space

## EQUITABLE

We recognize our privilege and seek to leverage our positionality to support and amplify the voices and solutions of youth, particularly youth of marginalized identities, on the frontlines of climate change.

#### **Reflection Question**

How do we bring people together? Who do we bring together?



- Youth tokenized and not fully integrated into decision-making/ solution mechanisms (there's a lot of lip service)
- Insights are developed (youth summit, youth reports, etc.) but never sourced
- Increased tendency for partisan and polarization amongst stakeholders
- Catering to the same youth (e.g. not captivating hard-toreach sectors, indigenous youth, or low-income populations)

- Recreating the process to carve out places for input
- Created conditions that enable meaningful contributions from a diverse set of stakeholders
- Finding
   unconventional ways,
   collaborations, and
   mergers with the aim
   of arriving at solutions
   (in our case, to
   address the climate
   crisis)
- Develop innovative solutions and see them through
- Facilitating systems change / accountability (ie. corporations)



#### **Reflection Question**

Does rad collaboration mean tearing down the status quo? Or does it mean making slow progress considering that inclusiveness/collaboration is important for a long-lasting change? Is it both? And, if so, how do you strike that balance?

**Reflection Questions** What other values do YOU believe are INNOVATIVE essential for rad collab? IMAGINATIVE HONEST **EQUALITY** LONGTERM **AMBITIOUS** BASE VALUES DATA **ACCOUNTABILITY** DRIVEN **FAIRNESS** DIVERSE **FLEXIBLE** INCLUSIVE

**Fairness:** somebody doesn't reap all the benefits

**Equality:** parties are all treated with respect and all voices are welcomed/considered. Youth perspectives are integrated in a meaningful way!

Diverse & Inclusive: Not just the usual suspects; includes actors from different backgrounds, sectors, etc. (even though even actors may be interested in different outcomes and want to participate for different reasons); listening to the most affected

**Innovative & Imaginative:** Shifts paradigms; the status quo is not enough. "Think as if there is no box!!!!" – John Beckles



**Data-driven**: focused on assessing the landscape before collaboration and measuring impact afterward; learning from mistakes of the past. Embracing complexity & researching local nuances/landscapes

Honest: calling out bullshit, being honest with oneself and each other about what's working/ what's not working, asking the hard questions and being truthful about it (note: calling out process is different from calling the content)

**Longterm:** not burning bridges

Flexible: empowerment, allyship

**Accountability:** action has to be taken; there needs to be follow-through

#### **Reflection Question**

What really is stopping us from holding the global superpowers accountable for their actions and inactions?

### DIMENSIONS OF RAD COLLAB

- Learning from data and actors that are 'not the usual suspects
- Understanding who is in the room and who we are representing/serving is key (key personas)
- Recognizing the strengths and weaknesses of each party
- Recognizing their overarching goals as individuals/ organizations (and doing our best not stepping on each other toes)
- Finding where our impact will be the greatest
- Getting alignment amongst partners: If we can align on a goal right off the bat, that's great! If not, aligning on values or asks/offers



#### Reflection Question

Is it about shifting the priorities of the people in power?

Acknowledging that some partners may:

- Have the same goal but different approaches, or never align with your goals and values... "They are never going to be convinced!" (know when to walk away)
- Creating new/safer spaces for everyone
- Integrating safety measures for people who are susceptible to harm & violence (systemically or personally)


